Marin Dacos and Delphine Cavallo build a case study of *Revues* portal of France (in French language) highlighting its unique features. We understand that it requires English version as well, for the greater audience of Asian continent which we have undertaken for the interest of our target audience, appearing in the next issue.

The Latin American picture is painted by Edgardo Civallero and Sara Plaza. A Paper by Mohammad Hanief Bhat is unique piece of research analysing open access scenario in J&K-a small state of India. Another research paper by S.M.Shafi in collaboration with Mohammad Hanief Bhat makes a comparative study of the open access impact across different types of disciplines. The paper is a modified version of a contribution presented at ELPUB 2008 (Toronto, Canada.)

However, I derive some satisfaction for, besides this publication, we conducted a workshop on the theme in March 2008 which ensued a beginning to launch e-repository (@ The University of Kashmir) for the scholarly literature emanating from prestigious institutions of J&K. Some home work and modalities are going on for the endeavor. The promotion of such initiatives and research in academic, social and technical aspects of Electronic Publishing has now become an area of interest to the department at various levels, the manifestation of
